Clallam County is updating its Shoreline Master Program, which regulates land use and development within 200 feet from rivers, lakes, streams, and marine shores. The SMP update process includes completion of inventory and analysis reports with corresponding maps and illustrations that characterize shoreline ecological conditions; development of shoreline policies, environmental designations, and use regulations; as well as analysis of cumulative impacts and uses, preparation of a shoreline restoration plan, and a formal local adoption process.
